

Welcome to The Slammer Tour!

Key info and tips for rookies.

The Slammer Tour is designed to be both fun and competitive, so please, don't ever lose sight of that. We all love to win but hey, this isn't the PGA!

The Rules of Golf

The rules are important for maintaining a level playing field and knowledge of the rules is your own responsibility. That said, nobody knows everything and most of us learn something new every time we play, so if you're ever unsure, just ask your playing partners for their opinion.

Three Levels of Rules

RCGA rules of match-play golf apply, except for local course rules and the Slammer rules as outlined on slammertour.com. Slammer rules take precedence, followed by local course rules and then RCGA rules.

The Most Commonly Misunderstood Rule

If you hit your ball and aren't sure you'll be able to find it, hit a "provisional ball" - just in case - because you can't just "take a drop", nor are you allowed to go back and hit again. If you lose your provisional ball, too, you may drop one in the fairway at a reasonable distance and **you'll be lying 5**.

Format & Rankings

The format on The Slammer Tour is match-play. We still keep track of scores but rankings are based on the results of matches. If you beat someone above you, you take their spot on the ladder and they move down below you. Match-play is great because even high-handicappers can beat the top players if they happen to have a great game.

Match-Play Format

In match-play, you win, tie or lose each hole until you run out of holes and a winner is declared... unless of course it ends up in a tie. Unlike stroke play where scoring is based on the total number of shots for the entire round, The Slammer Tour plays on a hole-by-hole basis. If you par the first hole, for example, and your opponent bogies it, you're "one up". Beat them again on hole #2 and you're "two up". If, for example, you are "three up" but there are only two holes left to play, you win the match!

Challenges

You must challenge at least one person in your group and you cannot decline a challenge. By default, you also challenge everyone else ranked lower than your top challenge and all challenges are five bones each. Come prepared to lose but ready to win!

Pace-of-Play

Nobody likes a five or six hour round, so we have a few special rules to keep things moving and fun. You have 30 seconds to hit your shot once you arrive at your ball so be ready to go when it's your turn. Also, you'll never score more than an eight on a hole (Slammie Max), and all eights are equal. If you hit your ball out of bounds, reload and go OB again, you get to drop one in the fairway where you'd be if you hit a good drive... and you're lying five.

Stick Handling & Fluffing

You get "preferred lies" in your own fairway, meaning you may stick-handle the ball within 12-inches no closer to the hole. But, don't even touch your ball if you're in the rough, woods, hazard or an adjacent fairway. You must play it as it lies when off your own fairway, or you will lose the hole.

Mulligans & Gimmies

There's no such thing as a mulligan on The Slammer Tour, but we are quite generous when you putt one close. Anything inside of 24 inches is a gimmie so be sure to mark your putter accordingly. Gimmies do not apply if the putt is to win or extend a match, or to clinch a "doggie".

Drops, Hazards & Penalty Strokes

We do adhere as much as possible to the standard Rules of Golf. Drops from hazards (point of entry) and unplayable lie drops, for example, must be carried out according to the rules and such drops will cost you one stroke.

Doggies & Skins

Whoever sticks their ball closest to the hole on each par three, and doesn't three-put or worse, wins a "doggie". Doggies are a mandatory part of The Tour. We also have an optional "skins game" where you can win cash if you get the lowest score on a particular hole. Entry fees for both doggies and skins are payable to the DoggieMaster before teeing off.

Protect Your Ball - And Yourself

Get yourself (or borrow) a magic marker and mark your name on your ball so there's no doubt whose ball it is. If you accidentally hit the wrong ball, you lose the hole... and that's no fun!
